When you come into the building there is a café with several tables, a concession and a box office (where you can pick up your tickets). It may be busy as there will be a lot of other people coming to see the play.

This is the auditorium where the play is performed. The audience (that's you) sit down to watch the play. It could be full of people and quite noisy.

#### How long is the play?

### What is the play about?

Set in Russia, in the very start of the 20th century, around 40 years after serfdom was abolished and about 17 years before the start of Russian Revolution, *The Cherry Orchard* revolves around Lyubov Ranevskaya's family. Lyubov, an aristocratic matriarch and landowner, returns to her ancestral estate after spending time abroad. The estate includes a beautiful cherry orchard, which holds significant emotional value for the family. Upon returning, the family discovers that the estate is on the verge of being auctioned off to settle the family's debts. Despite the imminent loss of the cherished orchard, the characters in the play struggle to adapt to the changing social and economic landscape in Russia. Lyubov, in particular, is unable to face the harsh reality of losing her estate and clings to the past.

The Cherry Orchard is a play about the clash between tradition and progress, about social change and generational conflict.

#### Station Master

**Spoiler Alert!** The notes below are provided for those who would benefit from being prepared for some of the more dramatic or scary elements of the performance.

- The play touches on subjects that the audience may find upsetting, including talk of a child's death by drowning, grief, a mention of suicide, and a threat of violence.
- Two guns are seen during the show although no guns are fired.
- A character gets hit on the head with a cane offstage and enters rubbing his head.
- A cup is dropped and broken on stage.
- An umbrella is swung as if to hit a character on the head but does not make contact.
- A character falls down the stairs offstage.
- There is loud singing and dancing in Old Russian styles.
- A character that looks like the Grim Reaper appears and scares some characters.
- There are screams and loud voices throughout.
- A bum is grabbed onstage without consent.
- A character bumps into furniture and steps on a hatbox destroying it.
- There is a lot of alcohol drinking.
- A fake cigar is smoked.
- There are card tricks and ventriloquism with a Dummy.
- A character is left behind at the end of the play to die.
- Characters weep with tears
