The remainder of the courses for the revised Health Care Assistant program revision that was approved at the last SCC meeting were presented for approval. Discussion indicated that in naming the courses, the department had followed procedures as set out by the provincial curriculum which are used at other universities and institutions. However, concern was expressed that ultimately, courses listed on student transcripts will differ from the course names on the University calendar.

SCC requested that Patrick meet with Anna Lee Boulton to resolve the title discrepancies and once this is resolved, the courses will be brought back to SCC as "information items".

SCC reviewed the package of courses submitted for the new degree. During the review, there was an issue regarding the pre-requisites of the 300 and 400 level communication courses and it was suggested that the pre-requisites be revised.

All the courses that have pre-requisites listed as 30 transferable university credits be changed to 45 university credits.
