SCC was requested to approve the following pre-requisite revisions:

- TOUR 250 retain "15 credits of 100-level or higher coursework" but remove "including TOUR 111";
- TOUR 404 change "75 credits of 100-level or higher coursework" to "60 credits of 100-level or higher coursework";
- TOUR 450 change "75 credits of 100-level or higher coursework" to "60 credits of 100-level or higher coursework";
- TOUR 422 change "60 credits of 100-level or higher coursework including ENGL 100, and TOUR 111 or TOUR 160 or REC 111" to "60 credits of 100-level or higher coursework"; this course is equivalent to TOUR 471; duplicate credit will not be granted for both courses, phase out TOUR 422;
- TOUR 471 change "none" to "60 credits of 100-level or higher coursework"; this course is equivalent to TOUR 422; duplicate credit will not be granted for both courses;
- TOUR 373 change "none" to "60 credits of 100-level or higher coursework";



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- TOUR 400 change "75 credits of 100-level or higher coursework including TOUR 205, plus one of REC 225 or TOUR 225 or TOUR 125, or TOUR 216" to "60 credits of 100-level or higher coursework";
- TOUR 416 change "TOUR 251, TOUR 252 and TOUR 316" to "TOUR 316 or TOUR 325";
- TOUR 451 change "75 credits of 100-level or higher coursework including TOUR 251 and TOUR 252" to "60 credits of 100-level or higher coursework";
- TOUR 457 retain "75 credits of 100-level or higher coursework" but remove "including TOUR 208;
- TOUR 342 retain "60 credits of 100-level or higher coursework" but remove "including REC 152 or REC 252";

SCC was requested to approve the addition of six new 3-credit courses to the legal electives offerings. The Paralegal Certificate Program Profile, Paralegal Certificate (Online) Program Profile and Bachelor of Legal Studies (Paralegal) Degree Program Profile are being revised to incorporate the new courses.

During the review of the course outlines, an issue was raised that there may be too much detail provided regarding the method of delivery of the courses in the "Course Format" sections of the six courses. It was suggested that it may be more appropriate to include such detailed information on the syllabus and that the course outlines include the standard language for method of delivery, i.e. "Three hours of class time, plus an additional hour delivered through on-line or other activities for a 15-week semester, which includes two weeks for final exams. This course may also be offered via mixed mode or online."

On the LAW 322 course outline, it was requested that item 7 be removed from the Course Student Learning Outcomes.

On the LAW 421 course outline, it was requested that "the Moodle" be changed to "Moodle" in the second bullet point under Course Student Learning Outcomes.

On the LAW 443 course outline, it was requested that "Participate in class discussions to" be removed from the beginning of item 4 under Course Student Learning Outcomes and that the hand-in assignments be described more consistently under the Evaluation Profile.

Halia Valladares moved and Sean Ashley seconded:

19/03 The six new elective courses, LAW 322 – Animal Law, LAW 355 – Immigration Law, LAW 421 – Civil Litigation, LAW 423 – E-Discovery, LAW 443 – Commercial Real Estate Law, and LAW 453 – Financing the Tech Start-Up be recommended to Senate for approval, as well as the program profiles for the Paralegal Certificate, the Paralegal Certificate (Online), and the Bachelor of Legal Studies (Paralegal) Degree.

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7. ANIMATION FUNDAMENTALS

Animation Fundamental Citation – Admission Requirements *Presented by: Ted Gervan*

SCC was requested to approve revisions to the admissions requirement for the Animation Fundamentals Citation. The current admissions requirement precludes students who are 17 when they graduate and students who may not have completed grade 11 when they apply. It also precludes students that may be 17 when they graduate from grade 12.

On review of the proposed revisions, concern was raised that the proposed revision may not clearly state the intent of making the program more accessible to students. In this regard, it was suggested to revise the language as follows; "BC Secondary School graduation (Grade 12) or equivalent; or Mature Student status; or currently enrolled in Grade 11 or equivalent."

Pascal Milleli moved and Jennifer Nesselroad seconded:

19/04 The revisions to the Animation Fundamentals Citation admissions requirement be recommended to Senate for approval.

The University of Hertfordshire is changing their program for Fall 2019 and, as a result, Capilano must realign the program to ensure the University



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meets the requirements of the recognition agreement to ensure students continue to have the opportunity to complete both programs.
