## 7. JAZZ

Bachelor of Music in Jazz Studies - Education

Admission Requirements, Continuation Requirements and Program Profile Bachelor of Music in Jazz Studies - Performance/Composition

Admission Requirements, Continuation Requirements and Program Profile Presented by: Jared Burrows

The Education stream program profile is being revised to reflect a change to the elective credits in Year Four and to the total program credits (down 1 credit to 131.50).

The Education and Performance/Composition stream program profiles are also being revised to reflect changes to the lists of ENSJ courses. The lists were updated to reflect current offering in Jazz and ENSM courses and allow some flexibility in timing when students take courses.

The revisions to the admission requirements include, but are not limited to, removing the Jazz Studies Diploma language (start at year 3 after the diploma) and adding a note regarding placement in ENSJ courses.

The revisions to the continuation requirements include, but are not limited to, stating the continuation GPA requirement more clearly.

On presentation of the proposed revisions, it was confirmed by the presenter that the revisions would have no impact on what was previously reviewed and approved by the Degree Quality Assurance Board (DQAB).

All revisions referenced in the Rationale and new program profiles were approved by the Committee. However, concern was raised regarding the use of the word "major" when referencing percussion majors and "courses specific to their major." It was therefore requested that the proposed revisions be approved, but that the department address the use of the word "major" within the next couple of months at SCC.



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Pascal Milelli moved and Michelle Gunness seconded:

17/03 The revisions to the Bachelor of Music in Jazz Studies – Education and Bachelor of Music in Jazz Studies – Performance/Composition admission and continuation requirements and program profiles be recommended to Senate for approval on the proviso that the word "major" be addressed and brought back to SCC in the next two months.

## 8. COMPUTING SCIENCE

COMP 115 - Writing Solid Code: Fundamentals

Presented by: Joseph Fall

COMP 115 – Writing Solid Code: Fundamentals is a new 4-credit course designed to offer students an opportunity for computational thinking and computer programming. On review of the course, concern was raised that the word "solid" is an acronym and needs to be capitalized.

A request was presented for the course to be considered for Quantitative/Analytical status; however, as a rationale was not included, it was recommended that the request be brought to the next meeting.

Kim Bothen moved and Marnie Findlater seconded

**17/04** The new course, COMP 115 – Writing SOLID Code: Fundamentals be recommended to Senate for approval with the proviso that the request for Q-course designation be brought to the next SCC meeting.

GEOG 221 – Mapping our Changing World

SCC was requested to approve the following revisions to GEOG 221 – Mapping our Changing World:

- course title change (from Map & Air Photo Interpretation)
- increase of credits from 3 to 4 (with no change in contact hours)
- removal of the prerequisites.



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On review and discussion, some issues were raised with respect to the selected readings. It was also noted that the course as presented needed more details to embrace issues of the 21<sup>st</sup> century and concern was raised that the course description may not justify the course content.

Derek Murray moved and Caroline Depatie seconded:

**17/05** The course title, credit number and prerequisite revisions to GEOG 221 – Mapping our Changing World be recommended to Senate for approval.

IDES 414 – Technology Intensive IV Presented by: Pascal Milelli

SCC was requested to approve the following revisions to IDES 414 – Technology Intensive IV:

- offer the course over 10 half-day sessions (instead of over five full-day sessions) to allow for better pacing for students
- course description
- course learning outcomes.

**17/06** The number of sessions, course description and course learning outcomes revisions to IDES 414 – Technology Intensive IV be recommended to Senate for approval.

BMKT 260 – Social Media Marketing Presented by: Darcie Hillebrand

BMKT 260 – Social Media Marketing is a new second year course and serves as a business elective (with a prerequisite of 15 credits) that will be available to the general student population.

On review of the course outline, concern was expressed with respect to the wording of the Course Outcomes. It was suggested that the current General Outcomes be renamed "Course Description" and that the current Specific



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Student Outcomes be renamed "Learning Outcomes." It was also suggested that the Learning Outcomes on page 2 of the course outline be revised so that they no long start with the word "To".

Halia Valladares moved and Marnie Findlater seconded

**17/07** The new course, BMKT 260 – Social Media Marketing be recommended to Senate for approval, subject to suggested revisions to the course outline.

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The prerequisite for TOUR 325 – Tourism Managerial Accounting was removed and a revision was made to the course description.
