Split Level Task Force Report 11.1

On further discussion, concern was expressed as to whether these courses were in fact required and that it may be more feasible to consider 400/500 split level courses.

It was suggested that the task force address the question of the viability and appropriateness of the 200/300 level split courses for offering. Should it be determined that this not be an approach at the institution,



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then the task force was asked to make recommendations for the current existing 200/300 level courses and provide clarity on construction, development and delivery of the 400/500 level split courses.
