SCC was requested to approve the new course, NABU 366 – Personal and Professional Sales for North America, as well as approve pre-requisite revisions to several courses in order to increase elective options for NABU, NABU Applied and NAIM students.

The North American Business Management Post Baccalaureate Diploma Program Profile, New Concentration; North American Business Management Applied Post Baccalaureate Diploma Program Profile, New Concentration; and the North American and International Management Graduate Diploma Program Profile, New Concentration are being revised to add various electives and the new course NABU 366. The Concentrations are being updated to include the additional electives and to increase the number of credits for each concentration from 9 to 15 in order to comply with policy.

The admission requirements for International Management Graduate Certificate and International Management Graduate Diploma are being revised by removing the economics degree and adding a Bachelor Tourism Management or a Bachelor of Communication Studies at Capilano University.



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The revisions to the program profiles for NAIM and INMA include the addition of SABA 501, 502 and 503 (instead of 12 credits of SABA 500).

SCI 369 – Revolutions and Revolutionary Thinking in Science Presented by: Lauren Moffatt

SCC was requested to approve the new course, SCI 369 – Revolutions and Revolutionary Thinking in Science and to grant quantitative/analytical status and science status.

Aurelea Mahood moved and Michelle Gunness seconded:

17/58 SCC recommend to Senate approval of the new course, SCI 369 - Revolutions and Revolutionary Thinking in Science, as well as the granting of quantitative/analytical status and science status.

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On review and discussion of the science status, issues were raised regarding whether the course aligns with the current framework of science course designation because the course, as proposed, is a science course only for non-majors. It was accordingly suggested that it may be timely for the science ad hoc committee to reconvene to review the existing list of courses attributed as science courses and to identify science courses for majors and those for non-majors.

11. BUSINESS ITEMS

(a) Requests from Student Services SCC Rep

Presented by: Deb Jamison

SCC was informed that two requests were received from Student Services: the first is to consider having their representative attend meetings by WebEx and the second is for the representative to consider curriculum with a mental health lens.

With regard to the first request for WebEx participation, members discussed possible implications of implementing non-physical attendance for members at meetings, specifically issues around voting and whether this would set a precedent for regular non-physical attendance of all members. It was noted, however, that the fact that the University does have regional campuses can be prohibitive for employees to participate in committees at the main campus and that technology could open the door for participation from all campuses.

Consensus was not reached on the issue of WebEx participation and it was suggested that Senate be requested to review participation options and provide input regarding how Senate and its sub-committees should conduct its meetings.



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On discussion regarding the representative employing a mental health lens when considering curriculum, members generally agreed that it is up to each specific area to determine a representative for a seat on the committee. However, it was suggested that a conversation be undertaken with the proposed new representative for clarification of how that lens is used when reviewing and considering curriculum.

(b) SCC Agenda Package

SCC was requested to consider the possibility of allowing the entire SCC agenda packages, which include course outlines and program profiles, to be posted to the University website and to be made accessible to all stakeholders. The current process allows only for the agenda and the prior meeting minutes to be posted as information.

Several concerns and issues were raised with respect to having all documents posted externally and the possible implications of having courses and program profiles posted prior to approval. Members also raised concerns regarding not having the entire agenda package posted and the perceived inaccessibility of the information to stakeholders.

As consensus was not reached, it was suggested that this item be brought to Senate for further review and discussion.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned at 2:00 pm.
