COURSE FORMAT:

Three hours of class time, plus an additional hour delivered through on-line or other activities for a 15 week semester, which includes two weeks for final exams.

COURSE PREREQUISITES:

45 credits of 100-level or higher coursework including 6 credits of 100 or 200-level AHIS.

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Using powerpoint lectures, seminar-style discussions of readings, and assignments, participants in this course will survey the history of photography from its technical beginnings in the 1830s to the use of photographic technologies in current practice. In considering the diverse uses of photography, we will focus on selected practitioners and aesthetic movements. Emphasis will be placed on the crucial socio-political, cultural, and aesthetic roles photography has played (as art, as historical document, as forensic evidence, in surveillance, as propaganda and ideology, etc.). We will critically examine the dominant debates and theories surrounding photography (its assumed status as objective "truth" and its relationship to representation and "the real").

COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES:

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- -define the major terms of reference in the analysis of historical and contemporary photography
- -articulate visual perceptions in an informed, cogent, and creative manner
- -provide a sense of historical content and a frame of reference for the cultural uses of photography

-analyze the critical interpretations of photography and the theoretical debates surrounding it.
