COURSE FORMAT:

Three hours of class time, plus an additional hour delivered through on-line or other activities for a 15 week semester, which includes two weeks for final exams.

COURSE PREREQUISITES:

45 credits of 100-level or higher course work including 3 credits of 100- or 200-level ANTH.

COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course will examine the way culture shapes the formation of identity for its members throughout their lifespan. Aging will encompass the whole lifespan from the moment of birth to death. It will provide a cross-cultural exploration the processes of aging through the lenses of gender, kinship, social organization, religion, politics and economics. Particular emphasis will be placed on understanding the acquisition of status and the societal roles that accompany each life stage.

COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES:

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- Demonstrate the application of core anthropological theories and methods to the study of aging
- Identify and evaluate the cross-cultural differences and similarities exhibited by life-stages.
- Understand and apply concepts concerning gender, kinship, social organization, religion, politics and economics to the study of lifestages.
- Research and analyze rites of passage from an anthropological perspective.

These outcomes will be assessed through two examinations, and two written assignments detailed below.

COURSE ASSIGNMENTS:

Comparative Lives

A research paper that compares the lives of either women or men in two distinct cultures. A detailed handout will be provided.

Rite of Passage

A recall, self-ethnographic account of a rite of passage. This will include the identification and analysis of the processes of enculturation and socialisation. A detailed handout will be provided.

Mid-Term and Final Exams

Short answer questions and the final exam will be cumulative.
