COURSE FORMAT:

Three hours of class time, plus an additional hour delivered through on-line or other activities for a 15-week semester, which includes two weeks for final exams.

COURSE PREREQUISITE:

ASAS 110

CALENDAR DESCRIPTION: This is an intermediate workshop course for the screen actor. Filmed scene work and monologues will comprise the practical aspect of the course. Students are expected to explore text analysis and provide a written analysis of their methodology at the end of the term. Students will improve their concentration and camera awareness. Script interpretation emphasizes personal technique, and classes simulate the atmosphere of a film or television shoot.

For Acting for Stage and Screen program students only.

COURSE STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

- Execute a series of exercises, scene and monologue studies;
- Improve their concentration and camera awareness;
- Interpret scripts with an emphasis on developing a strong personal technique based on the readings and exercises;
- Perform in a professional setting, experiencing the atmosphere of a film shoot;
- Understand the techniques of blocking, continuity, and scale of screen performance;
- Understand techniques for writing and performing comic material.

ASSIGNMENTS:

- Comic Writing Exercises the successful demonstration of techniques for comic and writing material for use in stand-up, sketch comedy, and screen scenes.
- 2. **Comedy Monologue:** the successful performance of a monologue demonstrating film comedy techniques, using stand-up and spoken word.
- 3. **Scene #1** the successful performance of a scene demonstrating the use of ideas introduced on camera and acting techniques and choices covered in class.
- 4. **Scene #2** successful performance of a prepared scene integrating feedback from scene #1.
- 5. **Mock auditions** -professionals from outside of Capilano U to provide feedback on prepared scene
- 6. **Professional Behaviour:** Students must demonstrate professional behaviour as outlined in the Theatre Department Standards for Professional Behaviour. Students will receive a mid-term progress report. In addition to forming part of the grade for this course, the end-of-term Professional Behaviour Reports are reviewed by Theatre Department audition committees.

Fraud: Creation or use of falsified documents.

Misuse or misrepresentation of sources: Presenting source material in such a way as to distort its original purpose or implication(s); misattributing words, ideas, etc. to someone other than the original source; misrepresenting or manipulating research findings or data; and/or suppressing aspects of findings or data in order to present conclusions in a light other than the research, taken as a whole, would support.

Plagiarism: Presenting or submitting, as one's own work, the research, words, ideas, artistic imagery, arguments, calculations, illustrations, or diagrams of another person or persons without explicit or accurate citation or credit.

Self-Plagiarism: Submitting one's own work for credit in more than one course without the permission of the instructors, or re-submitting work, in whole or in part, for which credit has already been granted without permission of the instructors.
