COURSE FORMAT: Three hours of class time, two lab hours plus an additional hour of supplemental activity delivered through on-line or other activities for a 15 week semester, which includes two weeks for final exams. **PRE-REQUISITES:** n/a COURSE OBJECTIVES: General: The student will: • gain a depth of understanding of basic chemistry, such that they will be prepared for any subsequent chemistry course. · learn to develop an awareness of the influence of science in our society and realise that science is not just a collection of isolated facts, but a series of interconnecting and overlapping ideas. Student Learning Outcomes: Upon successfully completing the course, the student should be able to: demonstrate understanding of simple atomic structure and • chemical bonding as related to the topics covered; · describe common elements and compounds (acids, bases, salts, etc.); • apply the scientific method, and critically evaluate media reports on topics involving chemistry; • demonstrate understanding of simple chemical reactions, balancing chemical equations and predicting chemical products; demonstrate an understanding of risk assessment, from a chemical perspective, with respect to food additives, cosmetics and medications; and demonstrate an understanding of how energy may be derived from chemical processes.

The most common circumstance justifying an increased performance evaluation mark is a student's improved performance in the final examination relative to the midterm exam(s), which the instructor feels justifies an elevated letter grade.

They do NOT include forgetting about the test, lack of preparation for the test, work-related or social obligations.

	2.	The student has notified the instructor (or the Pure and Applied Science office staff, if the instructor is not available) about the missed exam, test, quiz, lab, etc. Such notification MUST occur in advance, if possible, or at the latest, on the day of the exam, test, quiz, lab, etc.
	3.	Proof of the circumstances must be provided. Proof of illness or injury requires a note from a doctor, who may also be consulted.
	4.	The student has been fully participating in the course up until the circumstances that prevented the writing of the exam, test, quiz, lab, etc. Fully participating means attending almost all classes and turning in almost all assignments in the course.
