COURSE FORMAT

This course consists of six weeks (30 days) off campus practicum in; there will be practicum seminars prior to the start of practicum and during practicum. Students will also attend a meeting with faculty following practicum to discuss their practicum experience and to develop their proposal for the next practicum.

COURSE PREREQUISITE

None.

NOTE: It is the responsibility of the student to submit a written plan for an Advanced Studies practicum to the ECCE department and obtain faculty approval of the proposal prior to course registration. Students will be required to complete 6 non-ECCE credits relevant to their practicum which have been approved by the department.

EARLY CHILDHOOD CARE & EDUCATION DEPARTMENT VISION STATEMENT

The ECCE diploma / degree program fosters intellectual curiosity and critical thinking relevant to advocacy and leadership in early childhood education careers, advanced study, and lifelong learning.

GENERAL OVERVIEW

The Advanced Studies stream has two applied theory-practicum courses. In each successive course, students extend their knowledge and skills developed in the previous practicum. Education 382 is the second course in the sequence. Please note this stream cannot be used to obtain a post basic license to practice from the BC Early Childhood Registry

This course is a six-week practicum. The practicum placement will be in an approved setting which has an early years mandate. The intent is for the student to gain advanced practice skills in programs supporting young children and their families. Students will conduct in-depth examination of the program delivery, mandate and legislation associated with the program. Student will incrementally demonstrate advanced practice, knowledge and reflective skills. Student will be evaluated using either the occupational standards for early childhood educators or administrators in child care settings depending upon the practicum. Transportation costs will be incurred by the student.

Students are required to use digital or film cameras. Expect processing costs of up to \$25.00. All cameras must have the internet and GPS capabilities turned off while being used in this course.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

Students who successfully complete this course should be able to:

- Building on previous practicum the student will develop advanced skills in one or more of the following areas: administrative practices in early years, legislative and regulatory practices in early years, leadership and advocacy in early years; advanced and/or specialized curriculum implementation, or community services for children and families;
- 2) Collaborate with other professionals to plan, adapt, implement and evaluate practices that are site specific for the practicum;
- 3) Facilitate community connections and resources;
- 4) Establish relationships with other professionals through information and resource sharing;
- 5) Model and demonstrate professional competence with children, co-workers, parents and other professionals;
- 6) Continually evaluate the ethics of practice with young children and families;
- 7) Continually reflect on professional goals; and
- 8) Engage in on-going research into early years practice.
