COURSE FORMAT

Three hours of class time, plus an additional hour delivered through on-line or other activities for a 15-week semester, which includes two weeks for final exams.

COURSE PREREQUISITES

Any combination of two first year English courses.

CALENDAR DESCRIPTION

This course examines important works of Canadian literature across a range of genres and in relation to the unique history of Canadian cultural identity.

COURSE STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

On successful completion of this course, students will be able to do the following:

1. Interpret and critically evaluate a range of culturally significant works of Canadian literature and their significance for Canadian culture.

2. Describe and explain such historical influences as British romanticism, modernism, the role of colonialism in the formation of canon and literary culture, and the cultural significance of post-colonial critique in contemporary Canadian literature and culture.

- 3. Incorporate detailed observation, synthetic thinking, and insightful interpretation in written and oral work to demonstrate the ability to read with attention.
- 4. Compose essays and oral responses with a degree of historical awareness, self-reflection, analytical rigour, and imagination.
- 5. Prepare for and participate in class discussion and seminar groups with content designed to add to the collective understanding of texts and issues.
- 6. Compose essays that conform to accepted practices for conducting research and presenting evidence while also striving to be insightful, original, and creative.

Students who complete this Culture and Creative Expression course will be able to do the following:

- 1. Engage in creative processes including conception, investigation, execution, and ongoing critical analysis.
- 2. Identify, analyze, and critique the elements of a form of expression using its specific vocabulary.
- 3. Explain the significance of diverse forms of human creative expression, specifically including indigenous forms.
- 4. Explain or demonstrate the connection between various events, ideas, traditions, and belief systems and the modes in which they are artistically or culturally expressed.
- 5. Interpret diverse forms of creative expression from different perspectives (e.g. artistic, historical, Indigenous, literary, scientific, philosophical).

Misuse or misrepresentation of sources: Presenting source material in such a way as to distort its original purpose or implication(s); misattributing words, ideas, etc. to someone other than the original source; misrepresenting or manipulating research findings or data; and/or suppressing aspects of findings or data in order to present conclusions in a light other than the research, taken as a whole, would support.

Plagiarism: Presenting or submitting, as one's own work, the research, words, ideas, artistic imagery, arguments, calculations, illustrations, or diagrams of another person or persons without explicit or accurate citation or credit.

Self-Plagiarism: Submitting one's own work for credit in more than one course without the permission of the instructors, or re-submitting work, in whole or in part, for which credit has already been granted without permission of the instructors.

Prohibited Conduct: The following are examples of other conduct specifically prohibited:

- Taking unauthorized possession of the work of another student (for example, intercepting
