COURSE FORMAT

Three hours of class time, plus an additional hour delivered through on-line or other activities for a 15 week semester, which includes two weeks for final exams.

COURSE PREREQUISITES

45 credits of 100 level or higher coursework, including 6 credits of 100- or 200-level ENGL

COURSE DESCRIPTION

ENGL 390 is an advanced writing class focusing on developments in contemporary poetry and poetics, such as the long poem, serial forms, procedural writing, language-centred writing, ecopoetics, conceptual writing, appropriation, visual poetry, translation, prose poetry, documentarian forms, poet's theatre, guerrilla poetry, dialect & patois, and new media. The main goal of the course is the production of a manuscript of poems, a performance, and/or another substantial project. Other assignments include various writing exercises, development of a "poetics statement," and a peer critique of a manuscript.

COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES

Upon successful completion of this course, students will:

- have produced a substantial and potentially publishable manuscript of original poetry
- have advanced editorial skills, including the use of standard proofreading marks
- have an historical awareness of developments in contemporary literary production
- be fluent in the critical vocabulary of contemporary poetic practice

OPERATIONAL DETAILS

Electronic Devices:	No personal electronic devices (cell phones, pagers, calculators, electronic dictionaries, etc) may be used during an examination without prior approval from the instructor. During an exam, turn off all cell phones and pagers and remove them from the desk.
