COURSE FORMAT: Three hours of class time, plus an additional hour delivered through on-line or other activities for a 15 week semester, which includes two weeks for final exams.

PREREQUISITES: FNLG109

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course will continue utilizing the communicative approach to language learning and will focus on both comprehension and speaking. It will incorporate effective language learning strategies such as TPR (Total Physical Response) and TPR Storytelling. In this course, students will acquire basic vocabulary in Sháshíshálhem (the Sechelt language) for describing cycles (the seasonal round, the cycles of life, the life cycle of salmon), from a Sechelt perspective.

COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES:

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Tell a story about the personal life cycle of the Shíshálh (birth, puberty rites, marriage, death etc).
- 2. Tell a story associated with the seasonal round.
- 3. Tell a story about the cycle of life of the salmon.
- 4. Use the grammatical concepts of oblique constructions, passives and benefactives.
