COURSE FORMAT

Three hours of class time plus one hour delivered through on-line or other activities (on-line learning and language workshop), one hour of conversation with a Language Associate and a 45-minute dropin session of self-study at the Language Resource Centre (LRC, AR 117) for a 15-week semester, which includes two weeks for final exams.

None.

CALENDAR DESCRIPTION

This course is for absolute beginners and those who do not have Grade 11 French or the equivalent. It provides an intensive introduction to the French language, enhanced by computer practice, and an introduction to francophone culture. It aims to develop proficiency in all areas of communication: listening, reading, speaking, and writing. With FREN 101, it constitutes Grade 11 French.

COURSE NOTE

FREN 100 is an approved Culture and Creative Expression course for Cap Core requirements. This is not a course for students with training or background in French.

COURSE STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

COURSE ASSIGNMENTS

This course employs a communicative approach and French is the primary language of instruction. This approach requires that students spend a significant amount of time preparing for class if they are to succeed. Prior to class students must read assigned grammar sections with care and attention and complete the associated exercises.

Cahier personnel de devoirs

Students will write out grammar exercises from *Deux Mondes* in the assigned notebook (provided in class). Corrections will be made and identified in coloured pen. This notebook will be brought to EACH class for further questioning of the grammar content. There will be random assessment of the completion of these exercises through pop quizzes. Students must make an appointment with the instructor once in the beginning of the semester to discuss the cahier work. The *cahier* will be assessed through quizzes and during an appointment with the instructor. It will be collected on the last week of the semester.

<u>Lab (Language Resource Centre)</u>

Language labs provide the opportunity to further develop listening and pronunciation skills. Students must attend the Language Resource Centre (LRC in Arbutus 117) to complete assigned material (typically 45 min per week). The LRC will be open on a drop-in basis. Mark will be based on completion of weekly assignments.

Conversation

During conversation classes, students have the opportunity to practice speaking French in small groups. Mistakes and risk-taking are a normal part of the learning process; students are therefore encouraged to participate to the best of their ability. Students will participate in a one-hour conversation seminar on a weekly basis, during which oral exercises will be conducted based on lessons learned in the lecture.

Participation

Participation represents a significant part of the course, not just in the percentage of your grade but, more importantly, in the impact that it has on your learning and the environment in which we all work. Students are expected to come prepared to participate in all course activities by having done the assigned homework beforehand. During these activities, students should speak French as much as possible. Students are also expected to follow the basic rules of courtesy.

Tests and Final Exam

Exams will be given in-class following each text chapter and include listening comprehension, reading, and writing components. The final exam will be comprehensive.

Attendance

Attendance in class, labs and conversation sessions is required. It is the student's responsibility to catch up on any material missed due to absence from class, including announcements, assigned reading/homework and handouts. Students are expected to adhere to class times so as not to disrupt the activity of the class.

Language Usage

Students are expected to proofread all written work for any grammatical, spelling and stylistic errors.

Electronic Devices

Misuse or misrepresentation of sources: Presenting source material in such a way as to distort its original purpose or implication(s); misattributing words, ideas, etc. to someone other than the original source; misrepresenting or manipulating research findings or data; and/or suppressing aspects of findings or data in order to present conclusions in a light other than the research, taken as a whole, would support.

Plagiarism: Presenting or submitting, as one's own work, the research, words, ideas, artistic imagery, arguments, calculations, illustrations, or diagrams of another person or persons without explicit or accurate citation or credit.

Self-Plagiarism: Submitting one's own work for credit in more than one course without the permission of the instructors, or re-submitting work, in whole or in part, for which credit has already been granted without permission of the instructors.

Prohibited Conduct: The following are examples of other conduct specifically prohibited:
