Each unit provides an opportunity for students to creatively arrange and interpret the work of various composers and adapt the compositions for the small ensemble. Elements of jazz vocabulary to be studied will include: melodic paraphrasing; motivic development; relationship between lyrics and melodic/harmonic structure; chord/scale relationships; voice-leading guide tones; rhythmic construction of improvised lines; rehearsal techniques; elements of style and performance practice appropriate to the repertoire.
