**COURSE FORMAT:** 2 lecture hours and 1 instructor-led lab hour per week for 15 weeks

**PREREQUISITES:** JAZZ 272 with grade of C- or higher.

Our goal is to develop musicians who understand and value the rich history and traditions of jazz, who will be prepared to contribute to the evolution and growth of the art form in the future, and who will be equipped to engage creatively with current trends in music.

**COURSE OBJECTIVES:** Students will learn the basic techniques of vocal jazz arranging through

study and analysis of important vocal jazz arrangers and recordings.

STUDENT LEARNING **OUTCOMES:** 

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- show competency and fluency in arranging for a variety of vocal ensembles (with rhythm section accompaniment and a cappella);
- effectively use of these essential elements: lyricization, voice leading, reharmonization, formal plan, vocal range and texture;
- demonstrate through their creative output a knowledge of the work of important arrangers from jazz history in terms of rhythmic, melodic, formal, and harmonic practices common to the idiom;
- create arrangements of jazz standards and other music with intro, endings, background figures, solo sections, and other components appropriate to the idiom;
- show evidence of the personal study habits, attention to detail, and work ethic critical for professional success;
- integrate and implement the knowledge and techniques learned in JAZZ 303 and 304 in a practical and creative way;
- demonstrate musical problem solving and decision making abilities;
- produce arrangements with attention to details of notation, orchestration, harmony, melody, voicing, and counterpoint while keeping in mind the overall form of a larger musical project.

#### **COURSE CONTENT:**

Students will learn to arrange for SAB, SATB, and SSATBB vocal ensembles both with rhythm section and *a capella*. Throughout the course, students will be expected to learn by listening to and researching the work of important vocal jazz arrangers such as Fischer, Puerling, Swingle, etc.

1	Vocal ranges and timbral qualities related to range and tessitura.
2	Chord voicings for vocal ensemble. Assignment #1.
3	Lyricization and adaptation of instrumental music for voices. Assignment #2.
4	Texture and orchestration in <i>a capella</i> vocal writing. Assignment #3.
5	Integration of texture and orchestration in a vocal ensemble with rhythm section including
	idiomatic writing of accompaniment styles.
6	Reading, performance, and recording of final arrangements. (will continue into final exam period)
